RULES

1. Email or cash entries can pay on the day. Postal entries (**cheques only**) to reach Jen Logan, by Saturday 27th July. Members of SWI must state the branch to which they belong on entry form.
2. On the day of the show, computer generated labels with your name/number and the class you have entered will be handed to competitors. These can then be secured to exhibits in the usual way.
3. Only one entry allowed in all classes, except in Stick classes where no more than three entries are allowed.
4. Articles in the Handicraft classes must be the bona fide work of the competitor and completed within the last year. In the stick dressing—Class 79* 'a novice' has never won 1st place in any competition.
5. **Any younger age group is allowed to compete in the new 'Under 25 Years' section.**
6. The Committee is not responsible for exhibits.
7. Exhibits must be staged by 10.00am and should be uplifted between 4.30pm-5.00pm or risk disposal.
8. Entry Money: **30p per entry.** Competitors with fifteen or more entries will receive a free admission ticket to the Showground. **Please submit entries early giving plenty of time for your free admission ticket to be posted out to you.**
9. The judges decision is final.

Due to the risk of contamination we do not recommend that show items be consumed.

CLASS 39

TRAUMA TEDDY APPEAL

Trauma Teddies is a partnership between Children 1st and Police Scotland aiming to provide comfort and support to any child affected by traumatic or distressing events in Scotland. Police Officers attending incidents will give Trauma Teddies to children as a simple distraction to help take a child's focus away from potentially upsetting circumstances. This will help Police Officers build a relationship and turn the experience from a negative into something positive.



Knitting Pattern

Use only 8 ply wool or acrylic yarn. No mohair, angora, Feathersoft, Lurex or cotton yarn should be used anywhere on the teddy as these often cause allergic reactions.

You will need: Double knit yarns. Mixed, bright colours for clothing and a separate colour for body such as fawn. Small amount of black or dark coloured yarn for stitching face. Size 11 (3mm) knitting needles. A stitch holder or large safety pin would be useful. Stuffing – use polyester fibre conforming to BS5852/2 Furniture & Furnishings Fire Safety Regulations.

Key: Garter stitch: - all rows are knitted. Stocking stitch: - one row knit, one row purl

Pattern:

Paws and trousers: Using main teddy colour cast on 10 stitches and proceed in garter stitch for 10 rows. Change to trouser colour and continue in garter stitch for 30 rows. Break off yarn and repeat, casting on again for other leg. Stitches can be left on pin or stitch holder for ease. Using garter stitch and trouser colour, knit across all 20 stitches and work 16 rows.

Jumper: Change to jumper colour and work 24 rows.

Head and Face: Change to main teddy colour and in stocking stitch work 5.5 inches. Change back to jumper colour and in garter stitch work 24 rows. Continue working in reverse order to complete legs and paws. Stitch a happy face onto front of head using back or stem stitch in black or dark coloured yarn. Fold knitting in half at top of head to locate position. On wrong side, stitch sides of head together then turn right way.

Arms: Pick up 8 stitches either side of neck join (16 in total) and in garter stitch work 20 rows. Change to main teddy colour for paws and work a further 10 rows. Cast off. Repeat for other arm.

To Make Up: On wrong side, stitch up teddy with relevant colours leaving an opening in crotch for stuffing. Turn to right side. Stitch across corners of head for ears before stuffing.

Stuff rest of teddy and finish stitching crotch area. Run a thread around the neck area and draw in slightly to create better shape.

Scarf: Cast on 75 stitches in bright coloured yarn and using garter stitch work 4 rows and cast off. Tie round neck and stitch securely to back of neck. Do not stitch down at front.

CLASS 27

HIGHLANDERS

Recipe

300g/11 oz plain flour

25g/1 oz cornflour

125g/ 4 oz butter

125g/4 oz margarine

75g/3 oz icing sugar

Demerara sugar

Oven temperature: Gas 4, 180 C, 350 F. Quantity 40

Method

Cream fats and sugar then add flours. Roll into long sausage shapes and roll in demerara sugar. Place in fridge for 30 minutes then slice into biscuit shapes. Bake for 20 minutes until golden.
